- 2. Analyse and interpret spiritual themes in diverse literature and media sources
- 3. Design and implement an investigation in relation to a question of contemporary spiritual relevance
- 4. Disseminate the findings of spiritual investigation in publicly accessible format and language

Research Project Students will formulate a research question and construct a plan to progress a related investigation. The student will meet with the lecturer and/or tutor to discuss and refine their plan. They will then conduct the investigation and present their findings and conclusions in a public presentation format of their choice. Options for presentation may include a podcast, a blog article, an article suitable for submission to a relevant practical or academic journal, or a public lecture or workshop. A reference list must be included. Students will discuss their preferred presentation form with the lecturer/tutor at their earlier planning meeting and must receive approval before proceeding.
