Unit objective/s and broad content:

This unit will assist students to become more aware of the meaning, role and place of spirituality as a critical and universal factor in human consciousness and thriving. It will provide students with the vocabulary and rational basis from which to assertively prioritise their own spiritual growth at the same time as enabling spiritual awareness and intelligence in individuals, groups and organisations as a natural outworking of their chosen profession. We enter the exploration of spirituality in this unit from a Christian perspective that is by nature respectful towards, and curious about, the variety of spiritual expressions at play within a secular and pluralist society such as ours.

Learning outcomes for unit:

- 1. Demonstrate capacity for dialogue in the exploration of diverse spiritual themes and perspectives
- 2. Critically reflect on personal assumptions about spirituality and on new areas of inquiry
- 3. Construct and complete an investigation of a contemporary spiritual theme
- 4. Communicate the findings and conclusion of spiritual investigation in a publicly accessible format

Students will discuss their preferred presentation form with the lecturer/tutor at their earlier planning meeting and must receive approval before proceeding.
