SECTION 2 – ACADEMIC DETAILS

Brief description of the content of the unit

This unit introduces students to the foundations of appreciating and writing narrative fiction. In particular, the role of imaginative literature in reflecting and shaping society is considered through an exploration of a range of classic and contemporary works. In light of this reflection on the literary and cultural importance of narrative fiction, students develop their own original short stories through a guided approach to plot, character, theme, voice, point-of-view and other literary techniques.

Learning outcomes for the unit

- 1) Discuss themes of social and cultural importance in narrative fiction
- 2) Analyse creative writing techniques such as plot, theme, character, dialogue, voice, and point of view in a range of short fiction and apply them to their own writing
- 3) Develop, critique and revise their own short fiction through collaborative writing workshops
- 4) Evaluate the impact of their personal and cultural values on their own approach to storytelling
