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SECTION 2 – ACADEMIC DETAILS

Brief description of the content of the unit

This unit equips students with knowledge and skills to use interpretive tools based on Biblical Hebrew and New Testament Greek. It connects strongly with the MTC formation domain, *Engaging God's Story*. Students learn the Greek and Hebrew alphabets & transliterations, analyse the grammatical building blocks in English, Greek and Hebrew, synthesise the discussions in various grammatical and lexical tools and commentaries based on the biblical languages, and develop skills for the effective use of academic level Bible software. On completion of this unit, students, with the aid of Bible software, will confidently and faithfully engage in lexical and grammatical studies at a basic level to provide exegetical insights that are informed by the biblical languages, and present their findings to diverse contemporary audiences.

Learning outcomes for the unit

- 1) Distinguish the alphabets and transliteration systems and analyse the basic grammar and syntax of biblical Hebrew and New Testament Greek
- 2) Synthesise the discussions in various grammatical and lexical tools and commentaries based on the biblical languages, evaluating the contribution to the Bible's interpretation
- Effectively utilise key Hebrew and Greek language resources, including academic level Bible software and commentaries that focus on the biblical languages, to provide exegetical insights on biblical Hebrew and Greek New Testament texts.
- 4) Creatively communicate clear and coherent exegetical insights, based on the biblical languages, to diverse contemporary audiences
