Brief description of the content of the unit (key topics):

This unit aims to deepen the students' cultural intelligence, strengthen their skills for intercultural engagement and explore the practical implications for intercultural engagement in various Australian or majority world contexts. It connects strongly with the MTC formation domain, Engaging the Stories Together in Reflection. Key topics include: Biblical foundation, the relationship between Christian faith and culture, personal culture, knowledge and skills for intercultural engagement at a community level, and partnership and dialogue at an international level.

Learning outcomes for unit:

- 1) Explain the relationship between Christian faith and culture, and the significance for Christian life, service and ministry in the Australian context and beyond
- 2) Analyse one's own personal culture and how one can respond constructively to cultural diversity as a member of a local community and the global village
- 3) Examine a particular cultural context different from one's own, identifying cultural similarities and differences at personal and societal levels
- 4) Engage creatively, faithfully and respectfully with people of diverse cultural and religious backgrounds and suggest ways in which the Christian message and forms of expression could be contextualised
