Brief description of the content of the unit (key topics):

This unit provides students with an opportunity to explore the nature and practice of Christian worship - what it really encompasses, its biblical roots, its rich history, and its foundation in the Trinity. It connects strongly with the MTC formation domain *Engaging the World & Others' Stories* in Tabor MTC's curriculum paradigm. Ultimately, this unit aims to develop students' capacity as informed and effective leaders of Christian worship services. The key content of the unit includes worship, suffering and justice; worship and community (incl. children); worship and mission; worship and the arts and sacraments; practical aspects of worship ministry (such as preparing and leading a worship service and building an effective worship team); and contemporary worship issues and trends.

Learning outcomes for unit:

- (1) Analyse key issues, practices, and trends in contemporary Christian worship
- (2) Explain the interrelationship between worship, theology, and practice
- (3) Prepare and lead corporate worship services which reflect the story of the Gospel in a culturally relevant manner, and which draw upon resources from various Christian traditions
